In this paper, we make use of data from the LISS panel (Longitudinal Internet studies for the Social Sciences) managed by the non-profit research institute Centerdata (Tilburg University, the Netherlands).

### Reference to funding of LISS panel data in acknowledgments

The LISS panel data were collected by the non-profit research institute Centerdata (Tilburg University, the Netherlands). Funding for the panel's ongoing operations comes from the Domain Plan SSH and ODISSEI since 2019. The initial set-up of the LISS panel in 2007 was funded through the MESS project by the Netherlands Organization for Scientific Research (NWO).

### Short description of the LISS panel for use in text

The LISS panel is a representative sample of Dutch individuals who participate in monthly internet surveys. The panel is based on a true probability sample of households drawn from the population register by Statistics Netherlands. Self-registration is not possible, and households that would otherwise be unable to participate are provided with a computer and internet connection. The longitudinal LISS Core Study, consisting of separate topical surveys, has been conducted in the panel every year since 2007, covering a large variety of domains including health, work, education, income, housing, leisure and time use, political views, values and personality.
